



The 75/25 Anniversary will not only be an extra-special celebration bringing together our fraternity of Honoured Members, but our goal is to also contribute \$1 million in net proceeds from the "Legends Gala" to the newly established "Hockey Hall of Fame Development and Preservation Fund".

In the months ahead, we'll see new champions crowned in leagues both large and small, devoted to all aspects of the game. We congratulate the American and Russian teams on their recent gold medals in women's and men's Olympic hockey, respectively. In addition, we applaud Team USA for its gold in Para-Olympic hockey. 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HOCKEY HALL of FAME 75/25 ANNIVERSARY:

STATUS UPDATE

s reported in the fall 2017 edition of *Teammates*, 2018 is a momentous year for the Hockey Hall of Fame as it will commemorate 75 years since its inception on September 10, 1943 and 25 years since its destination attraction opened at BCE Place (now Brookfield Place) on June 18, 1993.

In view of these significant milestone anniversaries, the Hockey Hall of Fame launched the "75/25" inaugural endowment fundraising campaign with the goal of contributing \$1,000,000 in net proceeds from the Hockey Hall of Fame 75/25 Anniversary Legends Gala, the marquee event and focal point of the campaign to be held at historic Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto on Monday, June 25, 2018.

To achieve this fundraising goal, individuals and businesses are offered the opportunity to become Founding Members of the newly established Hockey Hall of Fame Development and Preservation Fund. Up to 75 Founding Members, each making a one-time contribution of \$25,000, will receive (among other benefits) tickets to attend the "Legends Gala" in the presence of the Hockey Hall of Fame's fraternity of Honoured Members and other special guests and entertainers.

To date, the Hall has confirmed 80% of the Founding Members, as well as all targeted event sponsorship commitments with special thanks to *WestJet*, *Canadian Tire*, *Corby*, *TSN* and *Upper Deck*. Plans are also shaping up for various "75/25" themed promotional activities at the Hockey Hall of Fame from June 18, 2018 to September 10, 2018 and a commemorative coffee table book titled "THE HALL" will be published by Montreal-based Griffintown Media for release in fall 2018.



STANLEY CUP ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS

125 YEARS OF EXISTENCE AND 100 YEARS OF NHL CHAMPIONS

here is no debate that the Stanley Cup has a unique relationship with its sport, incomparable to any other championship trophy. Whether we measure this by its illustrious and lengthy history, or its personalized element of engraving the name of every winner, or its unparalleled accessibility, allowing both hands-on access at the Hockey Hall of Fame or connecting first-hand with fans while travelling

throughout the globe, the Stanley Cup embodies hockey and serves as the game's greatest ambassador.

This year represents the anniversary of two historic dates. One hundred and twenty-five years ago, on May 15, 1893, the Montreal Hockey Club under the umbrella of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association (MAAA) claimed the first Stanley Cup championship by virtue of finishing atop the AHA standings. Twenty-five years later, the Toronto

Arenas became the first NHL Stanley Cup champion when they defeated the Vancouver Millionaires 2-1 in the fifth and deciding game of the final on March 30, 1918.

Let us look at the origin of hockey's greatest trophy. It all began on February 4, 1889, when Lord Stanley of Preston, Canada's sixth Governor General, was invited to the annual Montreal Winter Carnival. The itinerary for Lord and Lady Stanley, along with two of their children,

included an appearance at the Victoria Skating Rink, where the Montreal Hockey Club from the MAAA was competing against the Montreal Victorias. So taken by the game that during his term, with some persuasion from his sons and daughter, who had all started playing the game themselves, Lord Stanley donated a "challenge cup which should be held from year to year by the champion hockey team in the Dominion of Canada." Purchased for the sum of 10 guineas (approximately

\$50 at the time; the equivalent to approximately \$1,300 today), the rest, shall we say, is hockey history.

The Hockey Hall of Fame, home of the Stanley Cup, expanded its tribute to these chalices during this anniversary year through a series of initiatives, including the unveiling of featured showcases and a customized app tour to kick off the March Break and coincide with the lead-up to the NHL playoffs. Artifacts include: Stanley Cup pucks dating back to

1901; rings, watches, and miniature Cups awarded to Stanley Cup champions; turn-of-the-19th century commemoratives and periodicals on Lord Stanley; pre-NHL Stanley Cup ribbons and memorabilia; as well as the tools used to craft and engrave the trophy.

When the 2018 champion hoists the Stanley Cup this spring, it will mark 125 years of unforgettable memories and triumphs. One remarkable trophy; one remarkable tradition.

HOCKEY'S NEWEST LEGENDS


With one of the largest Induction classes in recent memory, the Hockey Hall of Fame welcomed seven new Honoured Members in 2017. Following decades of developing the game, Clare Drake and Jeremy Jacobs were honoured in the Builder Category, while five players were inducted for their distinguished NHL, amateur and international careers. Dave Andreychuk was the epitome of consistency when it came to goal scoring in the NHL, while Danielle Goyette was one of the first true superstars in the women's game, leading Canada to multiple Olympic and World Championship titles. Mark Recchi is among the game's top point producers of all-time, while longtime Anaheim teammates Paul Kariya and Teemu Selanne were two of their generation's true superstars. All seven of hockey's newest legends were extremely generous in donating personal artifacts to represent their career highlights, some of which include:


- Dave Andreychuk Tampa Bay Lightning NHL record 250th power play goal stick and 556th goal stick/puck to surpass Johnny Bucyk.
- Clare Drake 1984 Team Canada Spengler Cup jacket and University of Alberta Golden Bears 500th career CIAU win plague.
- Danielle Goyette 1992 and 2007 Team Canada World Women's Championship gold medals and 2002 Olympic gold medal equipment including jersey.
- Jeremy Jacobs Boston/New England Regional Emmy Award trophy and piece of plexi-glass from 2011 Boston Bruins Stanley Cup championship.
- Paul Kariya 1996 Mighty Ducks of Anaheim 50th goal of season stick/ puck and 400th career NHL goal puck.
- Mark Recchi 1988 Team Canada World Junior jersey and 2011 Boston Bruins Stanley Cup jersey.
- Teemu Selanne 1992 Jokerit (Finland) jersey and 1997 Mighty Ducks of Anaheim 50th goal of season puck.

BACK-TO-BACK BLING

Not wanting to be outdone by his boss (club owner) and former Pittsburgh Penguins captain Mario Lemieux. Sidney Crosby captured his third Stanley Cup title, as well as became just the third player in history (joining Lemieux and Bernie Parent) to be awarded the Conn Smythe Trophy as playoff MVP in back-to-back seasons. After delivering a 2016 Stanley Cup ring to the Hall of Fame, the Penguins returned on November 29, 2017. Sidney Crosby was joined by teammates Kris Letang and Evgeni Malkin, along with General Manager Jim Rutherford, to present Hockey Hall of Fame Curator Phil Pritchard with the newest Stanley Cup ring. Donated by Penguins co-owners Ron Burkle and Mario Lemieux, this distinctive ring is an exact replica of Crosby's, featuring over 200 diamonds, including 10 yellow diamonds that make up the background of the Penguins logo atop the ring. Each player has his name and number and the phrase 'Back 2 Back' with two Stanley Cups on the left side of the ring. The defining part of the ring, however, is the number '5' which replaces the eye of the Penguins logo, representing a nod to the franchise's five Stanley Cup titles.

TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION

Call to Action number 87 of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's

2015 report on the residential school system reads: "We call upon all levels of government, in collaboration with Aboriginal peoples, sports halls of fame, and other relevant organizations, to provide public education that tells the national story of Aboriginal athletes in history." A shining light amongst the tragic stories of the indigenous program previously implemented in Canada was the important role that sports, and in particular hockey, played in the lives of students. One team was formed out of this group that stood out amongst its peers, taking its people on an international journey of recognition through our sport that saw them win three Oldtimer World Cup titles. Based in Sagkeeng First Nation, Manitoba (near Fort Alexander, just over 100km northeast of Winnipeg), the Sagkeeng Oldtimers were founded by Walter

and Verna Fontaine and joined the Canadian Oldtimers Association (now CARHA) in 1978. Through the years, they played in numerous national tournaments as well as in Denmark, Germany, England and France, winning the World Cup title in 1983, 1987 and 1989. Coordinated by the Fontaine's daughter, Darlene, an extensive collection of artifacts detailing the extensive history of this club's successes was recently donated to the Hockey Hall of Fame and presented to curator Phil Pritchard during a ceremony on January 9, 2018. A tribute to the former students and survivors of residential schools, this donation both preserves and illustrates the resilience and strength of the indigenous people.

NEW OLYMPIC CHAMPIONS

Since forming an official partnership with the International Ice Hockey Federation (IIHF) in 1998, and prior to the NHL's first full participation in the Winter Olympic Games in Nagano, Japan, the Hockey Hall of Fame has prided itself on acquiring, preserving and exhibiting the premiere collection of international artifacts in the world. As such, Hockey Hall of Fame curators make the journey to top-level IIHF events whenever possible, including the pinnacle of the sporting calendar every four years. This year, the Games took place in Pyeonchang, Korea, and both the women's and men's events saw new Olympic champions crowned. For the first time since 1998, Team USA took home the gold medal in women's hockey with a nerve-racking 3-2 shootout victory over the four-time defending champion Team Canada. Along with iersevs from every team, the Hockey Hall of Fame immediately secured Jocelyne Lamoureux-Davidson's historic game-winning-goal stick to preserve the moment for her country. With no NHL participation for the first time since 1994 on the men's side, the tournament was wide-open and would not disappoint, as Germany surprised all to capture their first-ever silver medal in hockey after falling 4-3 in overtime to the Olympic Athletes of Russia. Artifacts were received from former NHL stars Ilya Kovalchuk and Pavel Datsyuk, along with the historic overtime-winning goal puck that was retrieved after being fired home by Kirill Kaprizov.

In Memoriam



JOHNNY BOWER

Player Category (1976) November 8, 1924 – December 26, 2017

A star netminder for the Toronto Maple Leafs, Johnny Bower earned fame for both his stellar and fearless style of play. Maskless, he patented the goalie poke-check, diving dangerously head-first, stick outstretched, into the path of the puck and skates of an opposing player.

Bower spent 12 seasons with Toronto, earning the Vezina Trophy twice and helping the club to four Stanley Cup championships. In 2017, he was named one of the '100 Greatest NHL Players' in history.
